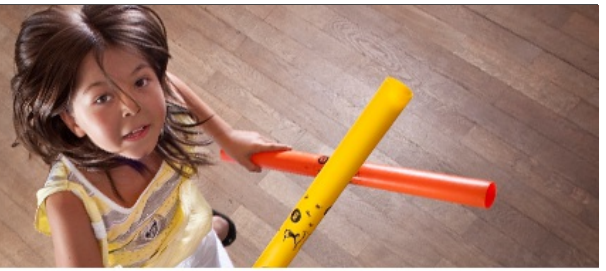

### Organisers



Creativity, Culture and Education (CCE) is an international foundation dedicated to unlocking the creativity of children and young people in and out of formal education. CCE proactively seeks out partners around the world to design and implement programmes which improve the quality and reach of cultural education, and use culture and the arts to improve the quality and impact of general education. CCE prioritises children and young people in the most disadvantaged communities by providing them with the space to nurture their own creative habits of mind: imagination, curiosity, discipline, resilience and collaboration and by deploying specially trained artists and creative practitioners to work as creative catalysts in the classroom alongside teachers. The work is supported and developed by an extensive on-going programme of research. CCE currently supports programmes in Lithuania, Norway, Sweden, Germany, The Czech Republic, Hungary, Wales, Scotland and Pakistan and is providing on-going training for artists and teachers elsewhere.



BKJ, Bundesvereinigung Kulturelle Kinder- und Jugendbildung e. V. (German Federation for Arts Education and Cultural Learning), is Germany's umbrella organisation for Arts Education and Cultural Learning in schools, cultural institutions, non-formal education and youth work. BKJ is a federation of 57 non-governmental organisations active in all fields of Arts Education and Cultural Learning on national and regional level. BKJ is the German government's key partner in the field of Arts Education and is concentrating on advocacy in the fields of culture, education and youth policy. BKJ is developing pilot-projects, organising conferences, publishing and networking with other sectors and organisations. With its international department, BKJ is fostering international exchange programs with young people and Arts Education experts. BKJ is actively networking with different partners at the European level and took part in the UNESCO World Conferences on Arts Education in 2006 and 2010.

### Conference partners



The International Network for Research in Arts Education (INRAE) emerged from a gathering of international leading researchers in arts education who met in Wildbad Kreuth, Germany, in 2011. UNESCO Chairs and Observatories for Arts Education all over the world initiated this symposium with the aim of furthering the goals of UNESCO's Seoul Agenda. This gathering agreed to formalise an arts education research network in order to work on the idea of comparative research and monitoring (mapping) in arts education. With this momentum the International Network for Research in Arts Education (INRAE) formed a steering committee chaired by Prof. Larry O'Farrell, Canada.



ACEnet is the EU-wide network of policy makers working in the fields of arts and cultural education. It was established in 2002 in the Netherlands and currently holds 86 members representing 30 countries across Europe. As an open and informal learning network, it strives to improve arts and cultural education in Europe, by exchanging information, knowledge, experiences and inspiration, and learning from each other. Its members are civil servants from ministries of education and culture of the different EU member states, enlarged by experts and professionals from different field institutes and organisations that function at arm's length of ministries.

Some concrete results at the international level are the Eurydice Survey on "Arts and Cultural Education at School in Europe" (2009, [www.eurydice.org](http://www.eurydice.org)), the participation in the OMC Working Group on Synergies with education,...

Since 2011, the network was revived, and the focus of the network has broadened from

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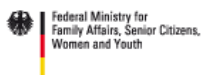

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sharing (knowledge, experiences, results of mostly national research projects), to also learning (about policy, practice, research) and provoking (advocating for) different policy levels.

There are communication links between ACEnet and other international bodies: with the DG Education and Culture of the European Commission (Open-Method-of-Coordination (OMC) Working Groups), OECD and UNESCO (via the INRAE network).

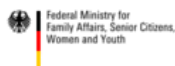
#### The conference is funded by
